September's Presentation:

Card Weaving Mini-Workshop
with
Patricia Kapitzky

Please bring a belt to the guild's September meeting.

Patricia Kapitzky has been a Public School music teacher, a Church cantor, organist and choir director. She has taught private lessons in piano, guitar, clarinet and ukulele.

When Pat's two children were young she took a year of weaving instruction at Hill Institute, a card weaving class at WEBS with Barbara Elkins and a Navajo Rug weaving class at Harrisville Designs with Tom Jipson.

Pat found that Card Weaving easily lends itself to the environs of children's summer away camp. She taught card weaving for many summers at a children's camp, Aldersgate, in Connecticut. The children learned to weave bracelets, headbands and belts. They practiced the weaving techniques and learned the vocabulary of weaving.

The simplicity of the equipment and techniques of card weaving lends itself to great creativity. You play with size, shape, color, fiber and found objects.

Please bring a belt to the guild's September meeting. You will stretch the warp threads between your belt and a clamp on the table or a hook on the wall. Pat hopes you will have some fun with the cards and twisted warp.

The May meeting was called to order at 6:34 PM by, Lynn Field, Chair. Lynn welcomed the 18 members present. The **Minutes** of the May meeting were approved as published.

Nancy Evans reported on **Treasury** activity, which included expenses for PVW's Big E Creative Arts Award and income from the Marketplace. Nancy reminded us that the loom rental portion of the Treasury is \$307. The treasury balance is now approximately \$4,985.00

Carol Birtwistle reminded members to both sign out books and sign them back in when you have returned them. Please borrow books for no more than 4 weeks to be fair to all that utilize the **Library**. Carol asked that members search their shelves and piles of book for Jacob Angstadt, His Weavers Patron Book, Volume 2. This is the thinner of the two volumes with tie-ups and treadlings. It's been missing and it needs to return to the Library. Carol offered to the membership a box of samples from a Toni Kormo 1979 workshop on acid dyes. Barbara Elkins shared that the **Discussion Group** meeting would be July 1st at 2:00. Barbara explained the format of the Discussion Group for new members.
